"Cast all your anxiety on him because he cares for you." (Peter 5:7)

I work with some die-hard baseball fanatics who often talk about the beauty of the curveball. A curveball is a breaking pitch that has more movement than just about any other pitch. It is thrown slower and with more overall break than a slider, and it is used to keep hitters off-balance. When executed correctly by a pitcher, a batter expecting a fastball will swing too early and over the top of the curveball.

Baseball terms usually go over my head because the only thing I ever focused on when I went to the Cubs games with my dad was the wonderful hot dogs. As a writer the phrase "throw a curveball" meant life throwing an unexpected obstacle that turned and tricked you causing a major upheaval in your sense of self.

Most of us have experienced times in our lives when an unexpected turn knocks us off balance and we don't know what hit us or how to get back up. The loss of a job, a failed relationship, an unexpected medical diagnosis are life's curveballs that can shatter our core beliefs.
